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2020 BOARD CHAIR'S REPORT

Barry Dent



I present my Report for the year ended 31 December 2020.

In last year's report I said 'change is a never ending process'. What I never envisaged were the significant changes that we would be forced to make in 2020 to actually survive. But survive we have and, in my opinion, we exited the year in a much stronger position than envisaged. What we need to do now is to use that position as a 'stepping stone' to bigger and better things.

OUR PEOPLE:

Whilst the 2020 Annual General Meeting was delayed, the Appointments Panel process had been completed for a March AGM. **Tim Bennetts** resigned his position and **Ben Sheat** was co-opted to the Board on 07 April 2020 in accordance with the Constitution. **Murray Kennedy's** position as an Appointed Board Member continued until the AGM was held on 13 October, at which time **Murray Kennedy** and **Ben Sheat** were appointed to the Board. My heartfelt thanks to Tim for his unselfish action and for his outstanding efforts whilst on the Board and involved in Canterbury basketball. Welcome back to Murray and welcome on board Ben!

Clive Beaumont completed his first year with us as General Manager in December. Clive has literally been thrown in at the 'deep end' and his leadership of the operational side of Canterbury basketball has been outstanding. **Marty Davison** resigned his referee coordination position during the year. All the best to Marty for the future!

STRATEGIC PLAN:

Our Strategic Plan for the three year period from 2019 to 2022 remains unchanged. The Plan, containing the Strategic Goals and the Outcomes has been published at the web site so all participants can be aware of its contents.

The Plan sets out four areas in particular to achieve. They are to be resilient, adaptable, to be growing and to be vibrant. It is fair to say that this Strategic Plan will be a significant challenge for us to achieve. The Board makes no apologies for this.

Basketball is a fast growing sport, especially at school level and in youth age groups, and we need to be 'ahead of the crowd' to ensure we can cater for this unrelenting growth. More effort is required to grow the women's game at all levels and we offer no apologies for this pursuit.

The General Manager has developed an Annual Operational Plan based on the Strategic Plan and this was approved near the end of 2020. Clive will report to the Board each meeting on meeting the contents of this Operational Plan.

ALLOYFOLD CANTERBURY WILDCATS:

The Wildcats are a very important step in the pathway for Canterbury women and a great branding opportunity for the future. The 2020 season saw the creation of a very different Women's National Basketball League competition because of Covid-19. The tournament was held entirely in Auckland with the Women's National League picking up a significant proportion of the costs. The Women's National

Development League did not proceed. However a 3x3 did and was held in Invercargill.

We need to get back to a home and away competition for the Women's National Basketball League and reinstate the Women's National Development League. This will mean we can actively promote these games to our loyal sponsors, fans and developing players.

The Scholarships for our young women which are tied to Wildcats players and their sponsors were not able to continue last season because no sponsors funding was received. We are hopeful of reinstating these Scholarships for our budding Wildcats in 2021.

KEY PARTNERSHIPS AND COLLABORATION:

In order to achieve those outcomes set out in the Strategic Plan we need to work alongside a number of other organisations. Those we work alongside include Basketball New Zealand (BBNZ), Women's National Leagues (Women's NBL), Canterbury Regional Basketball Foundation (CRBF), North Canterbury Basketball, Sport Canterbury, School Sport Canterbury and our local Clubs.

After a review of and significant discussion by the Board over many months it was decided to not renew our Agreement with the Canterbury Regional Basketball Foundation (CRBF) from 31 December 2020 and return our Representative programme in-house from 2021. This decision was not based on performance – indeed the performance of the programme over the previous six years was nothing less than wonderful – but on balance it was the Board's view that the programme was a community one and should be administered in-house. Hand-over of the programme to us was basically complete at year's end.

OUR FINANCES:

A review of the Annual Finance Report shows our financial position remains sound despite the Covid-19 pandemic. Our surplus for the 2020 year is slightly larger than 2019 and our net asset value has increased over 2019 as a result of this surplus.

During the lockdown and for two months after it there were no funds available to any organisation from Community Grant funders. This highlighted Board concerns that our Community Grant funding, at approximately 42% of total income, would create a risk to the CBA should this amount either reduce quickly or significantly. There is a need to diversify our income sources. The CBA has Charitable Status with the Inland Revenue. The Board intends to explore the ability to utilise our Charitable Status to assist to diversify our

income sources with more vigour going forward.

An area of satisfaction to the Board is the level of reserves held by the CBA. At year's end our reserves had increased to approximately 50% of the year's expenditure - an increase from last year and nearer to the Strategic Plan goal set in this respect.

OTHER ISSUES:

As a consequence of bringing the Representative programme in house a Basketball Development Plan (BDP) was approved and the position of a Basketball Development Manager was created to oversee all elements of the sport in Canterbury. The appointee will commence in 2021.

As a consequence of Covid-19 the Sports Minister has created a number of funding opportunities for sport and recreation – and in particular basketball. BBNZ has consulted widely over the 'Strengthen and Adapt' Review. The finalisation of the Report and subsequent action will not occur until 2021 but I expect that the CBA will have significant involvement in any redevelopment of the sport as a result of this Review. The 'Girls Got Game' programme was created in 2019 and I expect it to be rolled out to a greater number of Canterbury participants in 2021.

THE FUTURE:

The CBA will be 50 years old in August 2022. The Board will be looking to celebrate our fiftieth birthday in a fitting manner then.

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

Having started in my role in December 2019, I guess it is fair to say that the first full year in the role was and will be unique to my tenure as GM of Canterbury Basketball Association, and I hope that it will remain so and we can have a "normal" year in 2021, if there is such a thing.

I have made clear that there should be a balance between the recreational side of the Sport and the elite development pathways and, charged with putting into place the Strategic plan through to the end of 2022, I will always have this at the forefront of my considerations.

Change at BBNZ is coming particularly once the funding level from the Strength and Adapt fund from SportNZ is known. I will continue to advocate for the implementation of a structure across New Zealand which is more apt to deliver programmes which enhance all areas of the Sport.

Locally, I continue to challenge the team as to how we at CBA can enhance basketball, by adding value into the clubs and rolling out a raft of development programmes with regards to Club Capability, Coach Education and mentoring, Referee Development across all levels of the game.

The CBA club development plan must continue to move forward with existing clubs being assisted to amalgamate (where appropriate) and/or grow their capability. The target of 8 Tier 1 clubs is too ambitious given the playing population in clubs and the current level of clubs is sufficient in my view to service the needs of the community. Having fewer, well run and sustainable clubs is a far better target for the future.

An area of huge potential remains the development of the female side of the sport. At CBA we will aim to position ourselves at the forefront of this with specific emphasis in 2021 in the Girls Got Game

programme with other initiatives to be bolted on to this in due course.

A special thanks to all the CBA staff this year for their contribution and efforts in a challenging year. The CBA office operate as a genuine team and share a common vision for the future of the sport in Canterbury and New Zealand. In 2020 it would be hard for me to find a team of people who were more adaptable and responsive to constant changes that the pandemic imposed upon us, with the aim of ensuring that the Basketball community enjoyed a worthwhile season.

The CBA Board, who give generously of their time and expertise, should be given the credit they deserve in a difficult year. They too, showed great calmness, governance and adaptability in responding to what for a while seemed to be a threat to our very existence.

Our aim was always to maintain capacity and capability so that once the pandemic was over we retained the ability to deliver basketball to the community and with this in mind the Board approved a raft of budget changes to ensure sustainability both for CBA and for clubs. Overall these adaptations effectively put \$ 39 669 back into the basketball community by reducing fees, and investing in clubs to rollout programmes as well as coach education opportunities. At the end of the year a healthy surplus was achieved but it cannot be emphasised how close it was to being a completely different financial report.

I would also like to thank all those individuals and organisations who support the work of the Association and Clubs. The coaches, administrators, referees, funding organisations, sponsors, and players are all partners on the journey, and integral to the success of the sport in the region. I am looking forward to an exciting 2021, as we start the implementation of our new structure to enhance all aspects of our wonderful Sport.

CLUB BASKETBALL REPORT

OVERVIEW

2020 was one of the most challenging years to run a sport in, with a global pandemic affecting life for everyone in New Zealand.

ANZAC Day was our originally planned tip-off day, but with the entire country going into lockdown, the start of our season was delayed until it was deemed safe. Unsurprisingly, the basketball community in Canterbury adapted tremendously, getting teams ready to begin the competitions in mid to late June.

We had an increase in team entry numbers prior to Aotearoa going into lockdown, but ultimately were very happy to have the same number of teams able to play in our 2020 winter club competitions that had the previous season (166). The altered calendar meant most grades had a slight decrease in the number of games, with fees adjusted accordingly.

The necessary calendar changes meant we had to alter Finals days, and instead

ran a Finals Weekend, with both Saturday and Sunday used to find the winners of the 20 different grades we offered on September 26 and 27.

The McDonald's Thomson and Whelan competitions had 44 teams enter (three more than 2019). The major change these competitions had in 2020 was having the Division I and II finals split over two nights, with all games played on the show-court set-up at Cowles Stadium, a development well received by the teams and the sponsor alike. The competitions were to be used to qualify and seed teams for the BBNZ Secondary School National Championship, which is something we hope will be a feature adopted by BBNZ and SSNZ in the future, in terms of seeding our teams for any qualification tournaments.

The success of our implementation of self-registration for members (started in 2019) was shared on the BBNZ Technology

Roadshow with the other basketball associations from all over Aotearoa. Our knowledge of how the system could be used to help with contract tracing was a key component for the guidelines BBNZ prepared for all associations to run basketball activities under the country's level two guidelines.

Once again, I would like to thank all the administrators and coaches I deal with, the work many of you do as volunteers is so vital for what we are able to achieve as a sport, and I'm excited to see how much more we can do under "normal" circumstances. Everyone in the CBA office has gone above and beyond what would be expected from them in a regular year, which was immensely helpful enabling us to run our competitions as smoothly as possible.

ALLOYFOLD CANTERBURY WILDCATS REPORT

The Alloyfold Canterbury Wildcats weren't immune to the effects of COVID-19, appointing two separate Head Coaches in 2020. With Dene Robinson appointed initially, and beginning pre-season training before the planned NBL season was cancelled, Dene reluctantly stepped down from the position.

Once the Women's NBL was resurrected as the "18in18" (eighteen games played in eighteen nights), hosted entirely in Auckland in November I was fortunate enough to be appointed to the Head Coaching position to build on the work that Dene had started.

The compressed 18in18 season presented many challenges, however losing two major contributors to injury during the NBL 3x3 Cup which was held the week before the 18in18 season (Tessa Morrison for the entire campaign with an ACL injury, and Lauryn Hippolite with a calf strain) was a major blow to the team.

Despite this setback and the challenges posed by the significant travel, back to back games and tight turnarounds, the team buy-in was great, with a commitment to the cause, and an unwavering belief in the system which was evident throughout the campaign. With a "team first" culture based on the core values of Professionalism, Performance, Pride and Competitiveness, athlete and staff engagement and attendance were both very high throughout the season. Professional standards were built upon, with the team receiving many compliments about how

they conducted themselves to the highest standard, presented impeccably and professionally and represented the Canterbury Wildcats brand and the greater Canterbury basketball community proudly.

As an extension of the great work that Lori McDaniel does with community coach education, a Pilot Female Coach Program was created, with promising female coaches being involved in Wildcats' practices and planning. Vicky Cowley, Helen Williamson, Alice Clarkson and Ashlee Bilbrough all committed to developing their craft through immersing themselves fully into the Wildcats' environment, increasing their competencies, connections and confidence.

The Wildcats' campaign wouldn't have been possible without the unbelievable support from the CBA and the Wildcats' committee – THANK YOU! Some of the additional things provided which made a huge difference:

- Ability to take extra players and staff on the road outside of allocation
- Extra food budget on top of daily per diem provided
- Ability to provide a Refuel Station at trainings
- Media session
- A male taxi-squad who would come and play the team once a week during practice sessions
- The design of the apparel the team wore was the best in the league
- Prehab/Rehab equipment

COACH DEVELOPMENT AND WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Foreword

2020 turned out to be quite the year, but I am proud to say I am part of a sporting community that embraced the challenges, adapted, and was able to provide quality sporting experiences for our participants.

On a personal note, I would like to extend a massive thank-you to the CBA, and the wider basketball community, for supporting myself and my family through a devastating loss. It was in those difficult moments that I was truly able to appreciate just how much being a member of the Canterbury Basketball Association meant to me.

Lock Down

While lock down posed many challenges, it also presented some unique opportunities for us an organization.

Lock Down with Lori

Over the course of level 3 and 4 lock down, I was able to produce 21 episodes of generally light-hearted interactions with our local, and national, basketball community. These short videos allowed us all to still maintain some semblance of connection and togetherness in a time when we were having to stay physically removed from our neighbours and families and received over 25,000 views.

Hoops at Home

With the help of members of our community (and staff, James Lissaman), we were able to provide free weekly online skill sessions for our junior basketball participants during levels 3 and 4.

This programme was a truly collaborative effort, with families recording session from plans I provided, them sending me the footage to edit, and then James to post them on our Facebook page.

Over 4.5 thousand people viewed these videos during lock down.

Community Coaches Catch Up Newsletters

To make the most of our coaching community being at home, I started a weekly newsletter that contained links to podcasts, articles, and relevant drills and skills videos. This newsletter went out to anyone who had signed up for a coaching course with the CBA in the past two years.

With over 400 coaches receiving the email it was great to get feedback and responses on the content

FEMALE BASKETBALL

While there was a small, but steady, increase in the numbers of girls and women playing our sport in club and high school, what was most encouraging was the number of schools, and young girls taking advantage of our Girls Got Game programmes. Girls Got Game is a programme designed for primary school aged girls to give basketball a go in a safe environment, with their friends, while being coached by females

- 15 schools participating in the GGG programme in 2020
- 300 girls involved in Girls Got Game sessions in 2020
- 8 female coaches involved in delivering sessions
- 4 Clubs providing Girls Got Game programmes

COACH DEVELOPMENT

With the constant change of alert levels, many of our formal and official courses were postponed, interrupted, or reshaped to accommodate the restrictions. The positive side of this, is that we were able to deliver a few courses via zoom to some of our outlying associations and coaches which was a new experience for me.

The Coach Development aspect that I am most proud of in 2020, was the formation, and regular meeting, of 6 Club Development Officers into our Hoops Collab Group.

This group of dedicated development officers were able to meet multiple times during 2020 (including zoom meetings in lock down) to discuss and action some of the topics below in their respective clubs:

- What is best practice for Junior Basketball Competitions
- How can we show appreciation and value our to our members
- How can we best develop our club coaches
- How can we best create and share resources

- What tools can we use to best standardise delivery of our programmes
- Formal -v- Informal coach development

This collaboration has led to more parent and coach education being delivered in our clubs. We are excited that the number of development officers in our collab will increase in 2021.

Via Basketball New Zealand, we were able to provide online formal coaching courses via Sport Tutor, including an introductory course called Aktive Good Sports. This course and others were/ are available through our Canterbury Basketball Website.

2020 also saw our Coach Development and Coaching Resources links on our website updated. We have added links to the World Association of Basketball Coaches, and other relevant websites to assist our coaches in finding resources.

I was fortunate enough to be able to continue my personal development in 2020 through the following avenues:

BBNZ were able to host one Coach Development workshop for Regional Coach Development Officers in 2020. This was held in Auckland over a 3-day period

- BBNZ National Team Coaches forum held in Auckland over 2 days
- Sport New Zealand Leadership Conference and Workshop on Levels of Perspective and Balance is Better held in Auckland over 3 days
- PCS Coaches Network (CRBF) an ongoing cohort of basketball coaches in Canterbury
- Head Coaching a Basketball New Zealand National Age Group Team (Girls U15)

Being able to accommodate a world pandemic in 2020, has me greatly looking forward to what can be achieved in 2021.

Referee), Harry Skirrow, and Jayden Rosanowski. Referee Trainer: John Bartlett (Technical Commissioner).

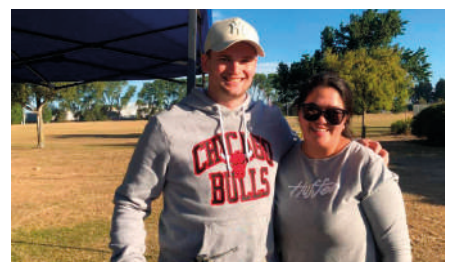





1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

Canterbury Basketball Association Incorporated is an incorporated society under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is also registered with the Charities Commission as a charitable entity under the Charities Act 2005.

Principal Activity

The Association is primarily engaged in the business of administering amateur basketball at all levels of the sport in the greater Christchurch region.

The nature of the Association's business has not changed during the year.

Measurement Base

These financial statements are Special Purpose financial statements.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies this year. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those adopted in previous years.

Specific Accounting Policies

In the preparation of these financial statements the following specific accounting policies that materially affect the measurement of financial performance and financial position have been applied:

(a) Goods & Services Tax

These financial statements have been prepared on a GST Exclusive basis, with the exception of accounts receivable and accounts payable which are shown inclusive of GST.

GST is accounted for on a "Payments" basis on a two-monthly reporting cycle.

(b) Inventory

Stock on hand is valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

(c) Income Tax

No provision for Income Tax has been made as the Association is registered for charitable purposes. All income derived by the Association is exempt pursuant to Section CW41 of the Income Tax Act 2007.

(d) Bank Account Balances



The bank account balances include any unpresented cheques and uncleared deposits at balance date.

(e) Accounts Receivable

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. All receivables are due within 12 months of balance date.

Bad Debts are written off in the year in which they are identified as irrecoverable.

(f) Accounts Payable

All payables are expected to be settled within 12 months of balance date.

(g) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

The Association has the following classes of Vehicle, Basketball and Office Equipment:

Class	Depreciation Rate	Method
Vehicle	30%	DV
Basketball Equipment	20-67%	DV
Office Equipment	16-67%	DV

All Vehicle, Basketball and Office Equipment are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation of the assets has been calculated in accordance with the maximum rates permitted under the Income Tax Act 2007. The actual rates used are pronounced on the attached Schedule of Fixed Assets and Depreciation.

Derecognition

An item of Plant and Equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal.

(h) Revenue

Entry and Registration Fees collected are accounted for on an accrual basis.

Donations Received are accounted for on a cash basis.

Grants Income is amortised over the term of the agreement, once all obligations pertaining to the advances have been fulfilled. The unexpired portion of any Grants Income at balance date is classified as Revenue in Advance and included in the Statement of Financial Position under Current Liabilities.

Interest Income is recognised when the deposit or investment has matured and the interest is accrued against the deposit or paid directly into the bank current account.

(i) Operating Leases

Leases under which all of the risks and benefits of ownership are effectively retained by the lessor are classified as operating leases. Operating lease payments are charged as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance in the periods under which they are incurred.

5. SECURITIES AND GUARANTEES
